The NRB feels strongly that neighborhood association meetings should be open to the public because of the level of input the City gives the public on different issues such as transitional housing and zoning. The NRB feels that if the City allows associations to speak for all residents, then all residents should be able to make their positions known at all meetings on issues that affect them. Neighborhood associations do not regularly refer to the recognition policy as they do bylaws. This

is why the NRB feels that merely having it mentioned in the policy does not have the same level of accountability as requiring associations to include it in their bylaws.

The NRB approved a motion on January 19, 2000, recommending to Council that, under the Standards for the Recognition of a Neighborhood Organization section of the Recognition Policy, subsection D, a new subheading be added titled "Open Meeting Policy".
