


According to Bill Way, leasing agent for the Iowa State Fair Exposition, the Danny Young Memorial Race is the only known 2000 event that would require a noise variance. Mr. Young must send a letter outlining the evening's events to the City.


Although the initial application was amended, this proposed amendment is designed to address situations when a variance in the time period is a desired option and quantifies the number of variances allowed per property. The property owner, or agent for the owner, will be the applicant for the variance since the maximum number of variances allowable is tied to the property.

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
