BACKGROUND -

BEN MONTIJO HOUSING SERVICES DIRECTOR

At February, 2000 Budget hearings, the City Council was informed about the condition at the Housing Agency which included: (1) 166 owned housing units vacant and in disrepair; (2) the low occupancy rates in the seventies percent range for both the Owned Housing and Section 8 Programs; (3) the deficit financial position of the Agency; (4) the deficiency of the Agency's office and maintenance space situation; and (5) the receipt of an "Advisory Score," which showed the Housing Agency was in a below 60 score, which is a "Troubled Agency Score." The advisory score listed the consequence if conditions were not remedied.

The City Council was also informed and provided a copy of The

Department of Housing and Urban Developments letter requiring the Agency to develop and submit an "Improvement Plan."

On April 3, 2000, the City Council (Roll Call #00-997) was presented an Improvement Plan for adoption.

The report attached to the roll call describes: (1) the condition of the Housing Agency in January, 2000; (2) the current condition of the Agency; and (3) projections for further progress toward raising the Agency from a troubled status to a standard performance status and, ultimately, to a high performance designation.

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
