| | On March 21, 1994, by Roll Call No. 94-953, the City Council approved the purchase of E-911 telephone equipment from US West Communications. This company has since changed its name to Qwest Communications. The Council also approved a maintenance repair and service contract for six years after the termination of the annual warranty. The maintenance contract has expired and new equipment has been added to this system. The new equipment added to this system deals with the wireless 911 requirements mandated by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). |

The new maintenance agreement will be valid for one year and then

reviewed for renewal by the Council. The initial six-year agreement expired November 4, 2001. Qwest carried on with the prior agreement until a new contract could be negotiated. The new contract will expire November 3, 2002.

The operational maintenance of this equipment is critical to providing assistance to the community. If this equipment fails or suffers from poor maintenance practices, Des Moines residents will not be able to contact the Police Department or the Fire Department for emergency services.
