BACKGROUND -

On January 26, 1998, by Roll Call No. 98-275, the City Council adopted the Urban Renewal Plan for the SE Agribusiness Urban Renewal Project, which was designed to encourage new investment with an emphasis on attracting and expanding value-added agricultural and related uses. On June 17, 2002, by Roll Call No. 02-1589, Council amended the Plan to provide for the acquisition and disposition of land in the vicinity of the 3400 to 4200 blocks primarily north of Vandalia Road. Furthermore, the Council authorized staff to start the acquisition process.

The IDED Board awarded the City of Des Moines a total of \$500,000, of which \$250,000 is a grant and \$250,000 is a forgivable loan. Funds are to be used for land assemblage activities in the Phase I project area bounded by SE 34th Street to the north to vacated East Granger Avenue, east to SE 36th Street, north to the abandoned Norfolk-Southern Railroad right-of-way, east to SE 38th Street, south to Vandalia Road, and west to SE 34th Street.

Land assemblage activities must be completed by June 30, 2007. The City shall repay all or part of the forgivable loan only if there is a minimum 15 percent increase in the taxable value of the Phase I project area. The state protects the City's downside risk and benefits when there is added tax value.

The Des Moines Agrimergent Technology Park is a very complex project that must be completed in stages. It has remarkable potential to increase the City's tax base, create jobs, and significantly improve the community's quality of life.
