TRIPP admissions, gifts, food, catering, rides, and rentals, permanent part-PARK AND time Guest Services positions are required. Six of these employees, who were hired in January 2002, are non-residents with a residency RECREATION DIRECTOR

requirement of July 24, 2002.

Section 2-486 of the Des Moines Municipal Code, Ordinance No. 11,255, Roll Call No. 89-443, adopted by Council on February 6, 1989, requires that permanent part-time employees establish residency in the City of Des Moines within seven months of employment.

The Blank Park Zoo began a year-round visitor season with the

The Park and Recreation Department is negotiating with the Blank Park Zoo Foundation for a proposed new 28E Management Agreement, which will be presented later this year for adoption by Council. As part of this agreement, the Zoo Foundation will operate Guest Services at the Zoo, and will directly employ seasonal and parttime employees required to provide these services. At the time the visitor season was extended year-round, it was anticipated that the 28E Agreement would be implemented prior to the residency requirement deadline.

In the past, when the Zoo was open to the public only during the summer season, these employees were normally employed for less than six months. Finalizing the 28E Agreement with the Zoo Foundation has taken longer than anticipated, and these experienced employees need to be retained by the City so that visitor services and the associated revenue can be maintained without interruption to allow for the transition to the Zoo Foundation management.

Staff requests that City Council waive the residency requirement for these employees from July 24, 2002 through June 30, 2003.
