#### **AGENDA HEADING:**

Hold public hearings regarding the issuance of general obligation bonds for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2013-14 Capital Improvement Budget and to advance refund the General Obligation Bonds, Series 2006A and General Obligation Urban Renewal Bonds, Series 2006B. Directing sale of \$37,985,000 General Obligation Bonds, Series 2013A (new projects) and \$22,535,000 General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2013B (refinancing).

#### **SYNOPSIS:**

Hold public hearings regarding the issuance of general obligation bonds and set the date for the sale. The first hearing is necessary to provide additional funding for the Municipal Service Center facility with the debt service paid from Tax Increment Financial (TIF) revenues. The second hearing is to authorize the advance refunding of the Series 2006A and Series 2006B bonds for savings. All other hearings associated with the FY 2013-14 Capital Improvement Budget were held in February. The third item for approval is to set the sale of the bonds for July 24<sup>th</sup> and approve the preliminary official statement(s).

# **FISCAL IMPACT:**

<u>Amount</u>: \$1,250,000 in additional bond proceeds associated with the Municipal Service Center. Total borrowing for new projects is \$37,985,000 plus interest; made up of \$37,345,000 project costs and \$640,000 issuance expenses.

### Funding Sources:

- Property Tax Debt Service Levy Debt Service Fund DS001, FIN900100;
- Tax Increment Fund Special Revenue Fund SP370, FIN909105.

The \$1,250,000 in additional bonds will be funded by the Southeast Agribusiness Tax Increment Fund. The savings associated with the refundings will be shared between the Property Tax Debt Service Levy and various TIF District Funds.

#### **ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:**

A public hearing must be held prior to any borrowing by the City. The first hearing is to consider bonding for the FY2013-14 Capital Improvement Budget associated with the Municipal Service Center project that was approved by City Council on April 8, 2013.

Additionally, there is an opportunity to refund two (2) series of bonds for savings. The refunding will have the same final maturity as the bonds being refunded.

City staff reviewed projects that anticipated the availability of non-City funding to determine the certainty of those funds. Only the East 46<sup>th</sup> and Hubbell Avenue Intersection Improvement project anticipates non-City funding that has not been committed to date. An application to the Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT) is being made and Engineering has a high level of confidence funding will be received.

There continues to be fewer municipal debt issuances scheduled for Wednesdays and therefore we can expect more aggressive bidding by holding a special meeting on Wednesday, July 24<sup>th</sup>. The following is the amount of debt being issued by category.
