AGENDA HEADING:

Recertification of Recognized Neighborhoods, 2017.

SYNOPSIS:

As part of the City's Neighborhood Recognition Policy, the City 'recertifies' Recognized neighborhoods that are in compliance with the annual survey and the requirements of the Neighborhood Recognition Policy. This year the annual survey was mailed via paper and digital format on March 10, 2017. Staff received completed surveys from all 51 Recognized neighborhoods. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

• ACCENT neighborhood asked to no longer be recognized, since they are unable to get members to serve on the Neighborhood Association Board. On June 7, 2017, the Neighborhood Revitalization Board (NRB) recommended to derecognize ACCENT neighborhood. This recommendation was forwarded to City Council for final action. On June 26, 2017, the City Council voted to suspend ACCENT neighborhood from the list of Recognized neighborhoods for six (6) months, to give the Neighborhood Association additional time to reorganize. ACCENT neighborhood will remain suspended or inactive for a period of six (6) months, and will be brought back for reconsideration by the NRB and City Council in January 2018.
