AGENDA HEADING:

Resolution to move Beaverdale Neighborhood from Designated to Charter status in accordance with the Neighborhood Revitalization Program.

SYNOPSIS:

The Beaverdale Neighborhood has successfully achieved a majority of identified goals in its updated Neighborhood Plan. The Neighborhood Revitalization Board and staff recommend that the Beaverdale Neighborhood be graduated from Designated to Charter status effective as of January 1, 2018.

FISCAL IMPACT: NONE

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

• In November 2011, the City of Des Moines invited neighborhoods to participate in the Neighborhood Revitalization Program's Charter Neighborhood Pilot Program. For the first time, Charter Neighborhoods with an existing plan that is more than 10 years old were allowed to update their plan. The pilot program was conducted in partnership with graduate students in Planning at Iowa State University (ISU). Beaverdale participated in 2012 as part of the 2-year pilot program.

- The planning process identified the following five (5) priority goals for the Beaverdale • Neighborhood Association (BNA) to address over the next five (5) to 10 years.
 - 1) Strengthen and expand the capacity of the BNA
 - 2) Advocate for better access to high quality education for neighborhood residents
 - 3) Retain existing residents and attract new families
 - 4) Improve the infrastructure in the neighborhood
 - 5) Ensure new development projects serve the needs of the neighborhood
- These goals were intended to build on Beaverdale's strengths, address challenges, and seize • opportunities that are likely to present themselves over the next several years. On March 25, 2013, by Roll Call No. 13-0517, the City Council approved the Beaverdale Neighborhood Plan Update and adopted the plan as an element of the Des Moines 2020 Community Character plan.
- Beaverdale Neighborhood has since taken specific steps to implement the goals of the updated • plan. A recent evaluation conducted by the BNA shows that the neighborhood has successfully achieved a majority of these goals. The BNA has requested that the City of Des Moines move them to Charter Status.
