







## Iowa Caucuses 2008 - An Exercise in Preparedness

Aviation Director Craig Smith wanted to prepare for the worst after the media, candidates plus their entourages, and campaign workers left lowa in a mass exodus after following the Caucuses. The ball started rolling in 2007 with planning among all the entities involved to insure the Airport was equipped and ready for the departures in the 2008 post-lowa Caucuses. The result was a DSM homerun in peak efficiency, dynamic results, and rave reviews from visitors and media.

Nearly 4,500 passengers boarded planes that day, compared to a normal day of 2,700. TSA reported a high of 581 passengers at the Security. Checkpoint during a one-hour period with a wait-time of only around three minutes. During the time period from January 3<sup>rd</sup> to January 7<sup>th</sup>, over 16,500 bags were screened, with a one-day high of 4,102 bags on January 4<sup>th</sup>. The return of rental cars, that proved to be a bottleneck in '04, ran smoothly while doubling weekend numbers of 130 vehicles a day and a one-day total on January 4<sup>th</sup> of about 1,500 returns.







## A NEW ERA FOR THE DSM INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT BOARD

It is with mixed emotions that I pen my first address as Chairman of the Des Moines International Airport (DSM) Board. There are so many good and exciting things to cover and one piece of sadness.

For Calendar Year 2007, the carriers at DSM enplaned 992,000 passengers, making that the second best enplanement year in the history of the Airport January and February 2008 were the best respective months ever for enplanements. Then oil went over \$100 per barrel, and the entire commercial

airline industry changed. By the end of the fiscal year, enplanements were only slightly ahead of last year's pace. I suspect some big changes are coming. While many small commercial airports have seen service completely pulled, so far we have been fortunate that only selective trimming has taken place.

Cargo handling at DSM is holding its own, but is still about 7% off last year's pace. Fuel prices and the weak economy are wreaking havoc with all areas of our industry.

Aviation Director Craig Smith has enacted a management reorganization plan that will lead to positive efficiencies. This Airport, and the functions that the personnel perform, have grown so tremendously over recent years that an adjustment was clearly needed.

The Board itself has a new composition. Besides my change in duties, we welcomed Elizabeth Ward, Roger Brooks and Nolden Gentry as new members. Ms. Ward is an entrepreneur selling children's books. Mr. Brooks is retired from the Insurance industry and Mr. Gentry is a managing partner with a local law firm.

Bad weather (snow, ice, fog, floods, and tornadoes) pounded lowa the last three months of 2007 and the first half of '08. Airport staff worked many long hours over the winter keeping the airport open. When winter was finally over, we had to deal with floods, tornadoes and high winds. In June, we couldn't avoid a sudden downburst of wind (70mph) that brought down the structural steel that was in place for the Mesaba Regional Jet Maintenance Hangar. It was quite impressive how each entity worked together to get us back on track. The facility should be ready to occupy by mid-November.

Lastly, I am saddened to report that we lost our friend and former Board Chairman John Fitzgibbon. John had served as Chairman for 25 years. He retired last July and passed away in March. He was great man who will be dearly missed.

# Capital Improvement. Projects & Operations Enhancement


New Terminal Paging System – Right after the first of the year in 2008 DSM officials announced the implementation of a new \$1.1 million paging system. The new system makes the Airport ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant. Audio announcements can be automatically programmed and the associated text appears simultaneously on the Hight Information Data Screens (FIDS). The system is programmed to monitor different sections of the airport for ambient noise and automatically adjust volume levels for the area.

South Access Road – By the end of the calendar year 2007, the paving of the South Service and Access Road was complete. The road is well-lit and will provide easier accessibility coming from and to the south portion of the airport. This is a key area to future development along Army Post Road and is the designated area for a future UPS Facility.


Airfield Vehicle Storage – By the end of the calendar year 2007, the completion of a much needed storage facility and a fuel island canopy for Airport Field vehicles was finished. The building is 46,400 sq. ft. and houses most of the snow removal equipment and vehicles.

Terminal Basemens Remodel/New Operations Center – The final piece in moving the Operations Center from the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the Terminal to the basement and a state-of-the-art operation was completed in June 2008. The security nerve cell looks like the helm of a starship and is fully operational now. The remodel also updated many tenant offices, provided a centrally located Scan Room for the Information Technology Department, and an expanded warehouse for the Paradies Gift Shops.

been a part of the DSM operation as a Fixed Based Operator (FBO). On May 15, 2008, they had an open house for their new 62,476 sq. fc. building which includes three 16,000 sq. fc. hangars. The building is evidence of the commitment that Elliott and DSM are making to have a premier general aviation facility here at DSM. The Northeast service road will provide a vital link and connect the FBO to the infrastructure of roads intertwining the Airport operation.








Airlines) officials announced plans to build an \$11.8 million, 75,000 sq. fc maintenance facility for the carrier's fleet of 50-seat CRJ200 Regional Jets (RJ's), as well as the 76-seat aircraft here at DSM. On hand were Airport and Mesaba officials, Congressman Leonard Boswell, members of the Des Moines City Council including Mayor Frank Cownie, and many other prominent Des Moines business officials. The building will be located adjacent to the South Cargo apron, and upon completion will house four aircraft bays. It will provide employment for 30 employees, mostly technicians and managers.

On June 25, a major windstorm knocked down the original steel frame of the structure producing a minor setback in construction. Fortunately, all the original footings were intact, and the contractor was able to order new steel quickly to keep the project within a couple of weeks of the original completion date of late this fall or early winter 2008.







Central lowa's Greatest Asset - A study commissioned by the lowa DOT Office of Aviation revealed that DSM International Airport produces \$522 million worth of economic impact per year. Airport activities support more than 5,000 jobs which produce an annual payroll of over \$200 million. The health and vitality of the local commercial airport is always in the top three decision making criteria for organizations looking to expand or relocate business and commerce.

2008 Spring Flood Affects City Operation - City officials, in the wake of a major flood impacting the City of Des Moines, decided to displace city employees to satellite locations due to the threat of City Hall flooding. City Departments of Engineering, Finance, and Human Resources took up residence in the Airport's Cloud Room for a few weeks. Other City staff were moved to the new Public Library and DM East High School.

New Chair Massage Opens on Concourse – In November of 2007, a new massage amenity, "Touch and Go," opened for travelers to relieve traveling stress and help make the time waiting for flights "fly" by. Originally, Two Rivers Massage out of the Quad-Cities managed the DSM operation, adding to their list of three branches at Midwestern airports. Now the operation has been turned over to a local massage therapy company, MVK Massage, operating daily in accordance with flight departure schedules.

75th Anniversary Parking Giveaway – In celebration of Des Moines Airport's 75th Anniversary in 2007, DSM officials decided to award free parking to a customer every day, starting on June 1, through the end of the calendar year 2007. A total of 214 winners were selected randomly at a different time every day. Winning amounts ranged from \$1 to \$117 and came to a total of \$4,358. In the accompanying picture, are the first winner, Dan Beran of Des Moines, and the last winner, Christine Keegan of Bloomfield, lowa.

New Non-stop Air Service to LAX and CLE - With two new daily non-stop destinations added

to the DSM line-up the total is up to an all-time high of 19 non-stop destinations. United Airlines announced service from DSM to Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) starting February 13, 2008. This was heralded as an opportunity for Central lowans to have non-stop service to each of its top ten popular travel destinations.

In June of 2008, Continental Airlines started daily non-stop service to Cleveland, Ohio (CLE). Not only was this another new destination, but it would be a wonderful alternative for connections to the East and South. In the attached picture, a collage of photographs shows four of Continental Airline associates, the RJ to be used for the flights and in the far right corner a picture of Joe and Christine Blake, parents of Casey Blake of Indianola, lowa, cutting the ribbon during the ceremony. The Blakes were given tickets to go watch their son, who played third base for the Cleveland Indians.

#### Interspace Advertising provides new look at DSM







#### REPORT ON FINANCIAL CONDITION

The fiscal year ending June 30, 2008, was a roller-coaster year financially. Highs during the year included record-level passenger, rental car, and concession revenues surrounding the lowa Caucuses in January 2008, significant increases in major non-airline revenue such as terminal advertising and parking, and key financial measures and ratios which are stronger than ever.

Low points during the past fiscal year included the rippling effect of rising oil prices on the airline industry, several dramatic unplanned increases in weather-related expenses such as runway delicing chemicals, which resulted from a particularly difficult winter season, and a rash of airline bankruptcies (although none directly affected DSM service).

The state of the airline industry was summarized by financial firm J.P. Morgan on April 15, 2008, as follows: "Should current fuel prices persist, the impact on industry profitability is expected to rival—if not exceed—that of the 9/11 terrorist attacks... While it may sound callous to frame fuel's rapid ascent against the far greater tragedy of 9/11, the math is indisputable—at current fuel prices, a similar attack on the industry's profitability appears underway..."

This led to a series of bankruptcies during the Spring of 2008. Fortunately oil prices retreated from previous highs, but significant damage was done to the overall industry as 65 airports across the country lost at least one airline during 2008, according to the Air Transport Association. Des Moines has thus far bucked this trend and has escaped significant cuts in service, which may be both a testament to a stable local economy and to the loyalty of Central lowa customers.

Despite the difficult economic times, the overall health of the Airport Enterprise Fund remained strong. Liquidity levels continued to rise, cash positions have improved from a negative cash balance at the end of FY2003 to now having nearly 250 days of operating expenses in reserve cash. During FY2008, DSM management achieved an internal goal of retaining over \$12 million in unrestricted cash funds.

While unaudited operations and financial data for Fiscal Year 2008 are not available at the time of this report's printing, preliminary internal reporting demonstrates robust gains made in all major categories of "non-aviation" revenues:

Parking revenue has trended up each year from 2003 levels; notable as the growth has come largely through increased activity; long-term public parking rates have remained unchanged since November 2003.


