The presence of an existing, mature tree canopy distinguishes Des Moines from other parts of the Des Moines' metropolitan area.

The Des Moines Plan and Zoning Commission is concerned about the removal of existing mature trees on private and public property within the City of Des Moines and requests that the City Council initiate actions authorizing the Planning Commission and City staff to prepare a Tree Preservation/Management Ordinance.

The Plan and Zoning Commission believes that the ordinance should achieve the following goals / objectives:

- 1. The ordinance / regulations must be simple and effective.
- 2. The ordinance must be implemented within existing financial and staff resources.
- 3. The ordinance should be implemented through existing development review and enforcement processes and new or duplicate processes should be avoided.
- 4. The ordinance should prevent land disturbance and tree removal on private and public property prior to receipt of development approvals under zoning, subdivision / development review, site plan review, and public improvement design and review processes.
- 5. The ordinance should ensure that existing mature trees are protected during construction.
- 6. The ordinance should preserve the right of the individual property owner to remove hazardous, diseased or damaged trees on lots smaller than the minimum size set by the ordinance.

Primary implementation steps could include the following:

- 1. Regulate any grading or tree removal on parcels or properties that are 20,000 square feet in size or greater.
- Require a tree survey during the subdivision, site plan review, or permitting processes. The tree survey should identify all the species and diameter of all trees 6 caliper inches or greater in size.

- 3. Allow removal of trees over 6 caliper inches or greater in size only per an approved tree removal and mitigation plan or with documentation from a certified arborist that the tree is hazardous, diseased or damaged.
- 4. Codify a replacement / mitigation-planting schedule commensurate with the tree(s) to be removed.
- 5. Codify tree protection requirements to be implemented during the construction of a project.
- 6. Require a licensed engineer, landscape architect, or certified arborist for the project to verify that protection measures are installed and maintained.
- 7. Provide incentives for extraordinary tree preservation such as tax abatement, allowing preserved trees to count towards new landscaping requirements, etc.
- 8. Provide penalties for non-compliance such as loss of tax abatement, fines, loss of construction bonds, etc.

While the above items will require significant discussion by committees and stakeholders, the Plan and Zoning Commission believes that it is imperative for the City Council to adopt an ordinance that addresses basic tree conservation and protection elements and that prevents removal of trees prior to the submittal, review and approval of plans or issuance of permits.

Prior to preparing the actual ordinance, the Plan and Zoning Commission would like to know if the Council considers this as an activity that is needed in the community.
