At your request the City of Des Moines scheduled an Administrative Hearing on October 9, 2008, at 1:00 p.m. regarding the declaration of your mixed breed dog, Baby Girl, to be a "vicious dog" by Sergeant Scott Raudabaugh, Chief Humane Officer for the City of Des Moines Animal Control Unit.

Sergeant Raudabaugh said that on September 30, 2008, James Lloyd's dog, a black and brindle mix breed dog named Baby Girl, was running-at-large when it chased after and bit a person jogging by Mr. Lloyd's residence. Animal Control was sent to the residence and found the dog, but Mr. Lloyd was not home. Shortly thereafter, Mr. Lloyd's mother arrived. Mr. Lloyd's dog was impounded because it was running-at-large and was not displaying a current rabies tag or dog license, which had recently been issued.

Sergeant Raudabaugh said that on September 11, 2008, Mr. Lloyd's dog was also running-at-large when it went into a neighbor's yard and attacked the neighbor's dog that was tied in its own yard. The owner of the victim dog was trying to defend his dog, when he was bitten. Sergeant Raudabaugh said that after the September 11, 2008 incident, Mr. Lloyd's dog was brought to the Animal Shelter for breed identification. The City Veterinarian determined Mr. Lloyd's dog did not exhibit the predominate characteristics of a vicious dog and it was released for home quarantine. On September 17, 2008, Animal Control responded to a complaint that Mr. Lloyd's dog was again running-atlarge, so it was impounded for the remainder of the quarantine at the Animal Control Shelter.

Sergeant Raudabaugh stated that because there were three bites (two bites to a person and one animal-on-animal bite) and Mr. Lloyd's inability/unwillingness to keep his dog, Baby Girl, under control, Sergeant Raudabaugh declared Mr. Lloyd's dog to be a vicious animal in a letter dated October 1, 2008.

Sergeant Raudabaugh said if the declaration is upheld, James Lloyd will be able to reclaim his dog if he gets the proper insurance necessary to license a vicious dog, and agrees to the special confinement of a vicious dog.

James Lloyd submitted two pictures and several letters into evidence (Appellant Exhibit 1). Mr. Lloyd said the man should not have tried to break up two dogs when they are fighting. Mr. Lloyd said he never heard anything from this man and according to the letter from Sergeant Raudabaugh, the jogger said there was a bite that caused a bruise. Mr. Lloyd said the bruise could have been caused by the dog jumping on the jogger, or the bruise might have already been there. Mr. Lloyd said if his dog is returned, he will make sure the backyard is fenced so his dog cannot get out again.

Diane Lorenz testified in Mr. Lloyd's defense and said she has two dogs of her own. Ms. Lorenz said her dogs play together and it sometimes might look like they are fighting, but they are just playing. Ms. Lorenz said she has a foster child who has an 18 month old baby that plays with Baby Girl and has never been hurt. Ms. Lorenz said that sometimes dogs just get loose.

Betty Lloyd, mother of James Lloyd, said she has been around Baby Girl since she was a pup and that the dog likes to play. Ms. Lloyd said no one should put their hand between two dogs that are playing because you would not know who bit you. Ms. Lloyd said regarding the jogger, you can tell a bite and that a bruise would not show up for awhile.

Josy Ennenga said she is James Lloyd's niece and that Baby Girl is not vicious. Ms. Ennenga said she and her boyfriend play and wrestle with Baby Girl and no one has been bitten. Ms. Ennenga said the neighbor children also play with Baby Girl.

Sergeant Raudabaugh said there are approximately 198,000 people and over 40,000 cats and dogs, along with other animals in the City of Des Moines. Animal Control needs to pay attention and take it seriously when a dog is running-at-large, going to neighbors' homes and bothering them and chasing joggers. Sergeant Raudabaugh said that was what happened in this case and the goal is not to destroy Mr. Lloyd's dog, but to control the dog.

I am upholding Sergeant Raudabaugh's declaration of James Lloyd's dog, to be a "vicious dog." The reasons for this determination are as follows:

- Mr. Lloyd's dog, Baby Girl, is a "vicious" dog as defined by Section 18-41 (1), (2), (3).
- Mr. Lloyd's dog, Baby Girl, has bitten on two separate occasions: September 11, 2008, Case #08-33241 (a dog and the dog's owner) and September 30, 2008, Case #08-35803 (a person)
- Mr. Lloyd's dog, Baby Girl, was running-at-large at the time of the above-referenced incidents, and was also picked up for running-at-large on September 17, 2008
- Mr. Lloyd failed to control or restrain his dog at the time of the attacks.

If you disagree with this decision, you have three (3) days to appeal the decision to the City Council. The appeal must be made in writing to the City Clerk's Office, and state the reason for the appeal. Sec. 18-41. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Chief of police means the legally designated chief of the police department or a designated representative.

Director of public health means the county health center director or a designated representative acting in behalf of the city.

Dog means and includes both male and female animals of the canine species.

Owner means any person owning, keeping or harboring a dog.

Vicious dog means:

- (1) Any dog which has attacked a human being or domestic animal one or more times, without provocation;
- (2) Any dog with a history, tendency or disposition to attack, to cause injury or to otherwise endanger the safety of human beings or domestic animals;
- (3) Any dog that snaps, bites, or manifests a disposition to snap or bite;
- (4) Any dog that has been trained for dog fighting, animal fighting or animal baiting or is owned or kept for such purposes;
- (5) Any dog trained to attack human beings, upon command or spontaneously in response to human activities, except dogs owned by and under the control of the police department, a law enforcement agency of the state or of the United States or a branch of the armed forces of the United States:
- (6) Staffordshire terrier breed of dog;
- (7) The American pit bull terrier breed of dog;
- (8) The American Staffordshire terrier breed of dog; or
- (9) Any dog which has the appearance and characteristics of being predominately of the breeds of Staffordshire terrier, American pit bull terrier, American Staffordshire terrier.

Sec. 18-59. Seizure, impoundment and disposition of vicious dogs.

- (a) The chief humane officer or his or her designee, in his or her discretion or upon receipt of a complaint alleging that a particular dog is a vicious dog as defined in this article, may declare such dog a vicious dog by delivering a written notice of declaration to the owner. The notice shall include a description of the dog and the basis for the declaration of viciousness. The notice shall also set forth that the owner shall be required to license and confine the dog as required by this article. The notice shall be served upon any adult residing at the premises where the animal is located or may be posted on those premises if no adult is present to accept service.
- (b) The person owning, keeping, sheltering, or harboring the dog in question may contest the declaration of viciousness by filing a written request with the city clerk within three business days of the receipt of the chief humane officer's declaration. If at this time the owner agrees to confine the dog pursuant to section 18-56 of this chapter and submits to the clerk proof of insurance as described in section 18-44, the dog shall not be impounded pending appeal. Failure to file a request for hearing shall constitute a waiver of any right to contest the declaration of the chief humane officer, and the chief humane officer or his or her designee shall be authorized to seize and impound the dog. A dog so seized shall be impounded for a period of seven days. If, at the end of the impoundment period, the owner has not licensed and shown ability to confine the dog as required by this article the chief humane officer or his or her designee shall cause the dog to be destroyed.
- (c) The person owning, keeping, sheltering, or harboring the dog in question shall be given not less than 72 hours' written notice of the time and place of the hearing. The notice shall set forth the description of the dog in question and the basis for the allegation of viciousness. The notice shall also set forth that, if the determination of the chief humane officer is upheld, the owner shall be required to license and confine the dog as required by this article. The notice shall be served in the same manner as the declaration notice.
- (d) If, after hearing, the city manager or his or her designee upholds the determination of the chief humane officer that the dog is a vicious dog or is a vicious dog held in violation of this article, as set out in the notice of hearing, the city manager or his or her designee shall order the person owning, sheltering, harboring or keeping the animal to permanently license and confine the dog as required by this article. The order shall immediately be served upon the individual or entity against whom issued in the same manner as the notice of hearing. If the order is not complied with within three days of its issuance, the city manager or his or her designee is authorized to seize and impound the dog. A dog so seized shall be impounded for a period of seven days. If, at the end of the impoundment period, the individual or entity against whom the order of the city manager or his or her designee was issued has not appealed such order to the city council or has not complied with the order, the city manager or his or her designee shall cause the dog to be destroyed.
- (e) The order to license and confine a vicious dog issued by the city manager or his or her designee may be appealed to the city council. In order to appeal such order, written notice of appeal must be filed with the city clerk within three days after receipt of the order. Failure to file such written notice of appeal shall constitute a waiver of the right to appeal the order of the city manager or his or her designee.
- (f) The notice of appeal shall state the grounds for such appeal and shall be delivered personally or by certified mail to the city clerk. The hearing of such appeal shall be scheduled within 20 days of the receipt of notice of appeal. The hearing may be continued for good cause. After such hearing the city council may affirm or reverse the order of the city manager or his or her designee. Such determination shall be contained in a written decision and shall be filed with the city clerk within three days after the hearing or any continued session thereof. The hearing shall be confined to the record made before the city manager or his or her designee, the arguments of the parties or their representatives, any additional evidence which was not

available at the time of the hearing before the city manager or his or her designee, and any other information the city council deems necessary.

- (g) If the city council affirms the action of the city manager or his or her designee, the city council shall order in its written decision that the individual or entity owning, sheltering, harboring, or keeping such vicious dog shall license and confine the dog as required by this article. The decision and order shall immediately be served upon the person against whom rendered in the same manner as the notice set out in subsection (a) of this section. If the original order of the city manager or his or her designee is not appealed and is not complied with within three days or the order of the city council after appeal is not complied with within three days of its issuance, the chief humane officer or his or her designee is authorized to seize and impound such vicious dog. A dog so seized shall be impounded for a period of seven days. If, at the end of the impoundment period, the individual or entity against whom the decision and order of the city manager or his or her designee or the city council was issued has not petitioned the county district court for a review of the order or has not complied with the order, the city manager or his or her designee shall cause the dog to be destroyed in a humane manner.
- (h) Failure to comply with an order of the city manager or his or her designee issued pursuant to this section and not appealed or of the city council after appeal is a misdemeanor.
- (i) Any dog that is alleged to be vicious and that is under impoundment or quarantine at the animal shelter shall not be released to the owner, but shall continue to be held at the expense of the owner pending the outcome of the hearing. All costs of such impoundment or quarantine shall be paid by the owner if the dog is determined to be vicious. If the dog is not determined to be vicious, the owner shall only pay those costs attributable to initial confinement prior to notice or costs of any required quarantine.
- (j) All vicious dogs shall have an identification microchip implant placed under the dogs skin. Prior to the release of a vicious dog from the animal shelter the owner shall pay the fee in the amount set in the schedule of fees adopted by the city council by resolution for the microchip identification procedure. If a contractor microchips a dog pursuant to this section, the contractor shall retain the fee.

Mr. Lloyd,

On September 30, 2008 your black colored mixed breed dog, named "Baby Girl," was running at-large when it chased after and bit a person that was jogging by your residence. The bite caused a bruise but did not cause a broken skin injury. (2008-35803) Your dog was impounded and taken to the animal shelter because it was running at-large, it was not displaying the current city pet license and because of another similar and recent incident.

On September 11, 2008 your dog was running at-large when it entered a neighbor's yard and attacked and bit the neighbor's dog that was tied in its own yard, which caused injury to the neighbor's dog. During the attack the neighbor tried defending his dog when your dog bit him, which caused injury to your neighbor. (2008-33241)

Your dog was impounded and taken to the animal shelter for quarantine and for evaluation of breed characteristics. On September 12, 2008 you were allowed to "Home Quarantine" your dog. On September 17, 2008 your dog was again impounded and taken to the animal shelter because it was seen running at-large and your dog was kept at the animal shelter for the remainder of the quarantine.

Because your dogs behavior it is being declared a "Vicious Dog," as defined by city ordinance 18-41. You may reclaim your dog by properly licensing it as a vicious dog with the City Clerk's Office and properly confining/leashing it as a vicious dog, however, if your dog is found unlicensed as a vicious dog in the City of Des Moines twice it will be destroyed in a humane manner. Also if your dog is found not properly confined/leashed more than twice it will be destroyed in a humane manner.

You may appeal this declaration by filing a written appeal within three (3) business days with the City Clerk's Office in City Hall at 400 Robert D. Ray Drive in Des Moines, Iowa, however, during an appeal your dog will remain in impound at the animal shelter.

If you do nothing your dog will be destroyed in a humane manner.

HEARING OFFICER: Good afternoon.

My name is Leann Ducey, and I'm an administrative hearing officer.

It is 1:00 P.M. on October -- let's see, what is this?

Today is the 9th and we are conducting an administrative hearing on a vicious dog declaration.

The appellant is James Lloyd.

When I call you to speak today, please come up to the podium, state your full name and address and you will then be sworn in.

This is a formal hearing and to that matter the hearing is now opened.

Will the representative from the city please come forward, identify yourself and present any information you have pertaining to this hearing?

SERGEANT Raudabaugh: My name is Scott Raudabaugh, a police sergeant assigned to the animal control unit as a supervisor and in that capacity serve as a chief humane officer for the city of Des Moines, Iowa.

HEARING OFFICER: Please raise your right hand.

Do you Sergeant Scott Raudabaugh swear or affirm the testimony you're about to give is the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?

SERGEANT SCOTT Raudabaugh: Yes.

HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.

Go ahead.

SERGEANT Raudabaugh: I'd like to start out by submitting some records or some documents, I'm sorry, for the record.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

I will enter these as city exhibits starting with A.

SERGEANT Raudabaugh: I'd like to just kind of briefly go through what they are for the proceedings.

The first document is a copy of City Ordinance 18-41 which defines a vicious dog.

The next article or documents are the City Ordinance 18-59 which states about "seizure, impoundment and disposition of vicious dogs."

Behind that is a letter given, served on Mr. Lloyd informing him of the hearing today and his appeal behind that.

And behind that is the letter that was served on Mr. Lloyd identifying that the dog -- his dog was declared vicious and why.

Behind that is Des Moines Case 2008-35803 which is documentation of the bite that occurred on the 30th of September, 2008.

And there are various supplemental reports behind that as well.

Behind that is a copy of Des Moines Case 2008-33241 which documents the bite that occurred on the 11th of September, 2008.

And also with that is various supplemental reports.

On -- did you have any questions about those documents,

ma'am?

HEARING OFFICER: No, I didn't.

SERGEANT Raudabaugh: On September 30th, 2008, Mr.

Lloyd's black colored -- it's kind of a black and bread

dough colored mixed breed dog named Baby Girl was running

at large when it chased after and bit a person that was

jogging by his residence.

The bite did not break the skin.

However, it did cause a bruising type injury.

When the animal control officers arrived, they found the dog, but Mr. Lloyd was not at home.

Shortly thereafter, Mr. Lloyd's mother arrived.

The dog was impounded because, one, it was running at large and two, it was not displaying current rabies tag or current city license which had been issued recently.

On September 11th, Mr. Lloyd's dog, Baby Girl, was also running at large when it jumped -- went into a neighbor's yard and attacked the neighbor's dog that was tied in its own yard.

The owner of the other dog attempted to defend his dog when Mr. Lloyd's dog bit him as well.

After the September 11th bite, the dog was impounded for breed identification.

It was brought to the animal shelter and the city veterinarian evaluated it and found that it did not -- did not exhibit predominant characteristics of a vicious dog. So Mr. Lloyd was allowed to home quarantine the dog. However, on September 17th, we responded to a complaint that the dog was again running at large and the dog was impounded for quarantine for the remainder of the quarantine at the animal shelter.

It's because of three bites and Mr. Lloyd's inability or unwillingness to keep this dog under control that the dog was declared vicious and ultimately the -- his appeal brought us to this point here.

That's all I have.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Now, you said there were three bites and now, first one was dog on dog?

SERGEANT Raudabaugh: That is correct -- no, September 30th, the dog was running at large when it bit somebody that was jogging by the house.

HEARING OFFICER: OK, perfect

SERGEANT Raudabaugh: On September 11th, it bit a neighbor's dog in its own yard -- in the neighbor's yard and while the owner of the other dog was trying to break up the incident, that neighbor was bit by Mr. Lloyd's dog as well.

HEARING OFFICER: OK, all right.

SERGEANT RAUDABAUGH: So two different dates but a total of three bites.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

SERGEANT RAUDABAUGH: OK.

HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.

SERGEANT RAUDABAUGH: I'll leave a copy of these documents up here in case Mr. Lloyd would like to look through them.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

SERGEANT RAUDABAUGH: Thank you.

HEARING OFFICER: James Lloyd?

Please state your name and address for the record.

JAMES LLOYD: My name is James A. Lloyd.

My address is 1909 Williams Street here in Des Moines, Iowa.

HEARING OFFICER: Please raise your right hand.

Do you, James Lloyd, swear or affirm the testimony you're about to give is the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?

JAMES LLOYD: Yes.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Go ahead.

Tell me why you're here today.

JAMES LLOYD: I'm here to hopefully -- I'm here to save my Baby Girl's life.

She's been more than a puppy to me.

She's been my life.

I would like to submit the two pictures that I have of her and showing that she's a very friendly dog.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

I can photocopy the pictures and then give the originals back to you.

JAMES LLOYD: OK.

Here, I also have a letter from my Broadlawns social worker, my rest care social worker, my case manager, all Broadlawns people.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

JAMES LLOYD: My neighbor lady, the manager of the store where I got Baby Girl from the store and if they've had any problems there.

This is another one of my neighbor's and then this is the vet and then the one time he looked at him (unintelligible).

And then I have a note here from my nephew who helped install a fence around my backyard so the dog would not be able to get out in the future at all.

And then I also have documentation here from my niece-in-law.

Her daughter was -- her daughter is 18 months old and her dog used to come -- my kid.

She seems a lot like it.

She spends a lot of time. They used to play with Baby Girl and there was never ever an incident.

And then I have documentation from my sister who happens to know me and somebody who just -- this is my house and also, this is from my oldest sister who comes over when my nephew is here who comes over once a week to mow my yard and he has no problems with the dog or anything like that.

I would like to submit this documentation.

HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.

JAMES LLOYD: Well, I have a cold and stuff like that and this morning, I just heard a program and they had a listeners poll.

And the question was should dogs be put to sleep if you're teasing it and you get bit?

And the poll was no, if you're teasing it, you're bringing it upon yourself.

That's just like how -- talking about the man when he was breaking the dogs up.

I went to -- done that with my bare hands, tried to break up the two dogs that were fighting, you know.

That to me doesn't make a lot of sense.

And when I went over to talk to him, he didn't have any proof of whether he was actually injured or anything else and as far as the jogger goes, I never heard anything from the jogger.

In the letter that I got from the Animal Rescue League said there was a bruise on this kid.

Well, a bruise could be from anything.

It could have been from the dog jumping on the jogger or, you know, it could have been anything as far as that goes. It could have happened in any sort of way.

I'm begging you to save my Baby Girl's life.

I'm not going to be able to replace her.

I've gone through, with family and stuff, I've gone through the expense of fencing my backyard completely and if she's going to come live with me, she'll be secure.

And -- I got to stop talking.

HEARING OFFICER: You need to tell me whatever you want to.

This is your chance now to talk.

So if you need a few minutes or if you have anything more to say or other people can speak, also.

OK?

DIANE LORENZ: May I speak?

HEARING OFFICER: Yes, I need your name and your address.

DIANE LORENZ: My name is Diane L. Lorenz.

HEARING OFFICER: How do you spell your last name?

DIANE LORENZ: It's L-o-r-e-n-z.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

And your address?

DIANE LORENZ: It's 427 College Street.

I live in Boone but I've lived here in Des Moines.

HEARING OFFICER: What's the zip code there?

DIANE LORENZ: 50036.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

If you'll please raise your right hand.

Do you Diane -- is it Lorenz?

DIANE LORENZ: L. Lorenz, yes.

HEARING OFFICER: L. Lorenz, swear or affirm the testimony you're about to give is the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?

DIANE LORENZ: I do.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Go ahead.

DIANE LORENZ: I have two dogs of my own that live in the house, and they're normally in the kennel during the daytime while we're at work but a lot of times they'll be in the front room playing, and when two dogs are playing together, they get kind of - somebody might say they get rough.

But they're back and forth.

It looks like they might be trying to bite each other. Especially my younger dog.

My older dog does that and, you know, somebody would see them outside playing, they might think one dog is attacking the other one, but my dogs do that every day just while they're playing.

And I know -- I've been at Jim's house.

I go there at least a couple of times a week to visit him and make sure everything is OK.

As you can tell, my brother is younger than me, but he's had a lot of problems in life.

He used to be a drug addict and so he used to do drugs and Baby Girl is kind of like his salvation so he can have something to nurture and take care of instead of go after the drugs so that's kind of like a life saver for Jim. We call him Jim but it's James.

So his dog is his life saver and I know when my dog, they bark at everybody and so dogs are going to bark.

Dogs are going to run up and jump on people.

Every time I've been at the house and seen Baby Girl, she would come up to me.

She'd kind of jump on me and sometimes if their claws are long, it's just, you know, scratch you and stuff but she just jumps on me and I play with her and I pet her and she likes to play.

I mean, all dogs do.

Then when they see another dog, they're going to want to play.

They don't realize they're not supposed to be playing and when somebody tries to break up two dogs when they're playing, it's going to seem like one of the dogs is trying to bite at you.

So not really biting at you, they're just trying to play with the other dog.

HEARING OFFICER: Right.

DIANE LORENZ: So I don't understand how one person could try to say you bit my dog -- your dog bit my dog.

If you weren't there to see it all, you don't know how they were playing or anything.

I've seen my dogs do it all the time.

And the one that says he was playing with his niece, she was my foster child.

She has an 18-month-old baby and me and the mom and the baby, we go over to Jim's house.

And, you know, the baby is just starting to walk and she walks all over the place and sometimes she's starting to run and we're like, you got to slow down because of the dog.

And the dog would just play with her.

Dog would let her pet him -- I mean, pet her. Sorry.

HEARING OFFICER: That's OK.

DIANE LORENZ: Would let her pet -- Braylin would pet Baby Girl and have no problems.

You know, and I know sometimes when I'm walking, because I try to walk outside, and if the dog comes up near me, it's walking fast, I slow down to a moderate pace or a slow pace because otherwise, when you're running, the dog thinks there's something wrong.

So sometimes they go after you not knowing.

I mean, Jim does always tries to keep his dog in the fence or in the house.

Sometimes dogs get loose.

My dog has gotten loose before.

We usually take him in the house and we have to go out the door and walk about five feet before I can put him in my

fenced-in yard and there was a couple of times that I let go by accident and the next thing I know the dog is gone. I have to go walk around the neighborhood and try to find the dog.

It just happens that in this case, the dog got out when he wasn't home.

It's not like he intended it to.

Dogs do that sometimes.

As soon as you get home, you go to find the dog.

That's what they did.

My mom was there to get the dog in the house.

They didn't know that the jogger jogged by and the dog ran out to meet the jogger.

He tried -- Baby Girl probably thought oh, I'm going to run out and play with you.

Dogs don't know any better.

They're like small children.

They don't know.

I played with the dog many times and everything.

It's never hurt me.

And sometimes I worry more about my own dogs.

My one dog Shelby, she's part shepherd and another part, and my sister came out of the house last night and as soon as we walked in the door, she started growling and barking and going crazy at her.

I said "Shelby, shut up, knock it off" and then she stops. But it's only because she thought somebody was coming in the house that she didn't know.

I walked in the house and Baby Girl didn't even jump.

She came to meet me and play with her.

So I mean, my dog walks and growls and I come in Jim's house, Baby Girl doesn't do that.

She comes up and lets me play and pet her.

And it doesn't make any sense.

HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.

Anyone else want to talk today?

Please state your name and address.

BETTY LLOYD: Betty Lloyd, 626 Southeast 26th Court.

HEARING OFFICER: 626 --

BETTY LLOYD: 646 Southeast 26th Court.

HEARING OFFICER: What did you say your first name

was?

BETTY LLOYD: Betty.

HEARING OFFICER: Please raise your right hand.

Do you, Betty Lloyd, swear or affirm the testimony you're about to give is the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?

BETTY LLOYD: I do.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Tell me why you're here today.

BETTY LLOYD: Well, I've been with Baby Girl since she was just a pup.

And she likes to play.

She went back where the dog was to play.

I've got two dogs, the youngest one will jump on the older one.

She's not jumping.

She's playing with her.

And when you get your hand between two dogs that are playing, you don't know who bit you, who got your hand or nothing.

Well, then, the second one supposedly, he was bit but they called it a bruise.

If it's just been bit within a half-hour, it would not be just a big bruise.

After a couple of days, it might look like a bruise.

But when it first happens, you can tell the difference between whether it's a bruise or a dog bite.

This was just a bruise right down in their own paperwork and that dog just loves to play.

She's just a playful pup and, you know, we're sorry that the people thought they got bit, but they did not.

I mean, they picked her up a couple of times.

They weren't afraid of her.

The kids next door come over and pet her and play with her.

Little baby in the house with her.

She's not a vicious dog.

And just to put her down because she likes to play?

That's what you call cruelty.

Now, they're supposed to be humane.

That's cruelty.

And none of them doesn't know what the other one's doing.

Like one hand don't know what the other hand is doing.

HEARING OFFICER: I don't understand that.

BETTY LLOYD: You don't follow that?

HEARING OFFICER: What are you referring to?

I'm sorry.

BETTY LLOYD: When she picked her up from the house.

HEARING OFFICER: Animal control?

BETTY LLOYD: Yes.

There was two women.

The woman is the one that picked her up.

And she said, well, it depends on what the sergeant has to say, but I know what he's going to say.

So we went in the next day to talk to the sergeant.

And he said, "Well, I got to wait until I talk to her first."

So one was going along with what the other one had to say but yet, she wasn't afraid of the dog.

But it's just a playful pup.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Thank you.

Anyone else?

Please state your name and address.

JOSIE ENNENGA: Josie Ennenga.

HEARING OFFICER: Josie.

How do you spell your last name?

JOSIE ENNENGA: E-N-N-E-N-G-A.

HEARING OFFICER: A-N-N-E-N-G-A?

JOSIE ENNENGA: No, E before that.

Like at the beginning.

It's E-N-N.

HEARING OFFICER: E-N-N and then what?

JOSIE ENNENGA: And then E-N again and then G-A.

HEARING OFFICER: And your address?

JOSIE ENNENGA: 1065 230th street.

It's in Boone.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

1065 what street?

You need to speak up because we are recording this.

JOSIE ENNENGA: 230th street.

HEARING OFFICER: 230th?

JOSIE ENNENGA: Uh-huh.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

And how do you pronounce your last name again?

JOSIE ENNENGA: Ennenga.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Please raise your right hand.

Do you, Josie Ennenga, swear or affirm the testimony you're about to give is the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth.

JOSIE ENNENGA: Yeah.

HEARING OFFICER: Are you related in some way?

JOSIE ENNENGA: Yeah, I'm his niece.

HEARING OFFICER: His niece.

Tell me why you're here today.

JOSIE ENNENGA: To prove that Baby Girl isn't vicious because like we -- me and my boyfriend go down there like quite often and like he gets along with us.

When we get out of the car, she'll meet with us and we play with her all the time but then my boyfriend and her will wrestle in the house.

When she plays, they'll wrestle and all this stuff and he doesn't like offend or nothing because he knows she's just playing, and we would go outside and the little kids next door would play with her, too.

And she always plays with us when we come over there, but she never bit us like traumatically or nothing.

It's like when she was playing with us.

And like she played in the backyard with us and we played like ball with her and stuff.

She doesn't like -- she just meets us and plays with us and she's not like -- she's just a normal puppy that likes to play.

She doesn't like attack anybody like traumatically.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Thank you.

Anyone else?

Sergeant?

SERGEANT RAUDABAUGH: Just want to address a couple of issues that were mentioned.

In the city of Des Moines, there is 198,000 people and over 40,000 cats and dogs that we're aware of.

There is a multitude of other animals besides raccoons and cows and horses and everything else.

When it comes to our attention that a dog is running at large, going over to neighbors and bothering them, chasing after joggers and bothering them, it's -- it would be inappropriate for us to take that in a nonchalant manner and just dismiss it that dogs will be dogs.

There's a need to look out for 198,000 people and 40,000 plus animals.

The -- and that was done in this case.

We looked out for those people and those animals.

The goal here is not to destroy the dog.

It is to control the dog.

Mr. Lloyd has an opportunity to get his dog back if he complies with city ordinance and does follow special rules for a dog that is -- that is acting in a special way.

He can get the dog back.

He can -- as long as he keeps it confined or leashed and insures it, then he can have the dog.

We're not trying to destroy the dog.

And last but not least, there is -- there was a comment about one hand not knowing what the other was doing.

The animal control officer went out there on a dog that was running at large.

Called me and asked me what we wanted to do.

I said impound it because of all the things that were going on.

The next day, Mr. Lloyd and his mother came in.

The paperwork, I did not have the paperwork in hand.

Before I released the dog or took any action, I wanted to read the report.

Pretty reasonable thing to do.

I wanted to make sure all this -- I knew all of the circumstances that the animal control officer experienced, witnessed, was informed about.

Once I got that paperwork, I reviewed the previous paperwork and subsequently created and had distributed the vicious dog declaration letter.

There was no confusion over what was going on.

I did not have the paperwork in hand and didn't want to make a decision without it.

Pure and simple.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

SERGEANT RAUDABAUGH: Thank you.

HEARING OFFICER: Anyone else?

You need to come up to the microphone.

OK.

Are you Diane?

DIANE LORENZ: Yes, I am.

HEARING OFFICER: Go ahead.

DIANE LORENZ: I realize that they have to look out for other people but to name a dog vicious from what we were told that they would put her to sleep and he couldn't have it back.

This is what we were told.

And that's why we're fighting the vicious part.

We want to bring his dog home.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

DIANE LORENZ: When my mom said about one person not knowing what the other person was talking about -- one hand

not talking to the other hand, what she meant is when she went to the office, she asked to talk to the sergeant, to talk to the sergeant.

Sergeant had to sign the paperwork.

Paperwork was not in the office.

It was supposedly from what she was told with the person that was not at work.

I work in an office, in a government office, our paperwork no matter what we do has to be in the office.

Not be at my home, not be on me some place else.

This should be filed.

For him not to be able to get the paperwork then to look at it and have to wait, I don't understand that.

It doesn't make any sense.

The paperwork should have been there and he sounded like -he made an opinion off what she said, not his own opinion.
He didn't even comment did the dogs hurt them when they
picked them up?

No, the dog did not.

Try to make it sound like the dog is vicious but yet, when the female officer picked up the dog, the dog just went. So how is that a vicious dog?

I don't understand.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

OK.

This is James.

Go ahead.

JAMES LLOYD: This is James Lloyd again.

HEARING OFFICER: Please speak up, sir.

We've got to make sure we get this clear.

JAMES LLOYD: Sorry.

HEARING OFFICER: That's OK.

JAMES LLOYD: I'm really not quite sure where I am, but I just really wanted to emphasize the fact that she's only like a year and 4 months old.

She's just a puppy and since this incident, I have put stronger fencing up.

At this point, the only way that I could possibly get around it is have this humongous amount of insurance on the dog which I've got that fence in, she's going to be chained but I just -- the insurance they're requiring is extravagant so there's no way possible for me to get my Baby Girl back and she -- I just think she's very special and she should not have to go through what she's going through.

She's just a very lovable dog so she'll sit up on your lap and she's just a very lovable dog.

I hope you will spare my dog, please.

HEARING OFFICER: Are you very clear on if the dog is determined to be vicious, what the requirements would be for you to own a vicious dog?

Are you clear?

Would you like to have Sergeant Raudabaugh come up and explain that to you so you are very clear what would be involved.

Do you understand completely?

JAMES LLOYD: I'm clear enough to know that there's no way that I can do that so that's why I need the viciousness taken off of my dog.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Would you just -- for me, just explain what -- why you think you couldn't -- if it's something to do with the insurance.

I'm not real clear on that.

The cost of the insurance or what?

JAMES LLOYD: Once your dog is deemed vicious, a lot of insurance company -- I haven't found any insurance company that will even carry it.

When you have a dog and then, if it's declared vicious, they're already covered but my dog is not vicious.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

I just wanted to make sure I was clear in my mind what you were saying about that.

JAMES LLOYD: Yeah.

Yeah, I can't get the insurance.

HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.

JAMES LLOYD: You're welcome.

HEARING OFFICER: OK, this is Betty Lloyd.

BETTY LLOYD: I don't think it's fair to put this dog

down as a vicious dog to begin with.

HEARING OFFICER: When you say -- what do you mean,

"put it down"?

BETTY LLOYD: Trying to say it's a vicious dog,

period.

OK, it's not a vicious dog.

So why should it have the title as a vicious dog?

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

BETTY LLOYD: I understand what you're saying.

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

Thank you.

Anyone else?

HEARING OFFICER: OK.

I was given a lot of paperwork, listened to what everyone had to say.

I need to go very thoroughly through the paperwork.

I need to listen to the tapes again because this is -these are very important hearings and so I don't like to

rule quickly on something like this.

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ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING OCTOBER 9, 2008

So I am not going to make a ruling today.

I'm going to very thoroughly review all the information that was provided to me.

I will take everything into consideration and what was said and given before I make a ruling, so it will be sometime next week before I get that ruling out.

It will be a written ruling and it will be hand delivered to you.

Once you have that ruling, that will be my final administrative decision.

Should you disagree, you do have the right to appeal to the city council but all that information will be in the letter.

But like I said, I have a very open mind right now, and I'm going to review everything very thoroughly before I make any decision.
