Birthplace of Des Moines /MLK wall :128 sq.ft

Design concept: by Hilde DeBruyne

The wall depicts a timeline of the history of Des Moines.

From left to right:

-Archeological investigations: for at least 3,000 years humans lived at the confluence of Des Moines and Raccoon Rivers: traces of pottery, arrowheads, coins, bottles...

-Native American History: the loway, the Fox and Sauk Indians

The feather is a symbol in Native American life: "the bringer of dreams", 'the breath of life". The feather, like all living things, is a gift and should be treated with respect.

-Centrally located: where the blue rivers meet (confluence of the Raccoon and the Des Moines River=Birthplace of Des Moines):

The eagle, symbol of courage and wisdom for Native Americans (master of the skies) and becoming the central symbol in the lowa Flag

- -The white settler/ First Dragoons / foundation of Fort Des Moines :1843 as a military garrison to protect the rights of the Sak and Fox Tribes
- -The Flowing river is the uniting line and color in the mural: means of life(need for water), transportation of goods and materials, transportation of ideas; uniting the past and the present
- -Parallel to the river: the growth of the tree, the oak leaves
 - the oak tree became the state symbol of Des Moines
 - -the rose: state flower

- -The growth of Des Moines as a city
- -the highway system/ transportation
- -the walking people/ walking towards the future

The overall design is streamlined, easy to understand and contemporary to fit into The Sec Taylor Stadium environment.

The colors are vibrant and alive.

The blue river unites all characters in the drawing
