Set Public Hearing for the Proposed 2015-2019 Five (5) Year Des Moines Strategic Plan and 2015 Action Plan for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Consolidated Plan

WHEREAS, at their meeting on July 2, 2014, the Neighborhood Revitalization Board (NRB) recommended the goals statements for the Five (5) Year (2015-2019) Strategic Plan, which is part of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Consolidated Plan, and the 2015 Action Plan, which NRB recommendation in minutes and goals statements (Exhibit B-2) are attached hereto; and

**WHEREAS**, on July 22, 2014, Neighborhood Planning Staff and members of the NRB hosted an informational presentation of the 2015-2019 Strategic Plan to gather public comment; and

**WHEREAS**, it is necessary, by public hearing following notice, to obtain the views of citizens regarding community development and housing needs and to provide a forum for citizen comment on the City's proposed 2015-2019 Strategic Plan and the 2015 Action Plan; and

**WHEREAS**, because this Council seeks to provide an oppportunity for citizens to comment on the City's proposed 2015- 2019 Strategic Plan and 2015 Action Plan, copies of the Plans will be available for review at the Office of the City Clerk, Department of Housing Services Administrative Office, Community Services Site Offices, and all public libraries until November 3, 2014.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the attached recommendation of the NRB regarding goals statements for the Five (5) Year (2015-2019) Strategic Plan and the 2015 Action Plan, is hereby received and filed.

Ray Drive, Des Moines, Iowa.

Lynch and Famoso gave a presentation on the Martin Luther King Jr. Park Neighborhood Plan.

Kelly Kennedy asked if there was a moratorium that would protect against a property tax increase for homeowners who fix up their homes. Lynch stated they could apply for tax abatement.

Kennedy asked how many vacant homes are in the neighborhood. Chris stated 918 were reported vacant two years ago. Lynch noted that determining vacancy is hard.

Kennedy asked how many homes were boarded up. Lynch stated there were 10 public nuisances at this time.

Carol Gathright expressed here gratitude for the hard work and effort put forth by Lynch and Famoso. She also mentioned that Odell McGhee was very responsible for getting neighborhood members to attend the meetings and events.



Redevelop and rehabilitate traditional neighborhoods, outside of the downtown area, to increase affordable housing and to maintain property values and improve neighborhood appearances in income-eligible areas.

Develop new affordable housing to increase the housing opportunities in an emerging downtown residential neighborhood. Activities eligible under Residential Development would include, but are not limited to:

- Land and property acquisitions
- Renovation of neighborhood or downtown commercial properties, including a mixed use of residential and commercial space
- Renovation of historic properties
- Relocation costs

## **CONTINUUM OF CARE GRANT PROGRAMS**

**DES MOINES EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT PROGRAM** 

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Homeless Assistance programs (Emergency Solutions Grant Program and the Continuum of Care Competitive Grant Program) are coordinated as complimentary programs under the HEARTH ACT of 2009.

The Strategic Plan Priorities of the Polk County Continuum of Care are:

- Adopt a Housing First approach in all homeless assistance;
- Prioritize Chronically Homeless and the most critical needs;
- Implement a Centralized Assessment and Intake System;
- Invest in a robust Rapid Rehousing component;
- Expand permanent supportive housing.

Through the Emergency Solutions Grant the following categories of assistance are eligible for funding:

- Street Outreach
- Essential Services
- Emergency Shelter or Emergency Transitional Housing
- Homeless Prevention
- Rapid Rehousing
- Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
