RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING SUBMISSION OF LETTER OF SUPPORT AND PARTNERSHIP WITH THE IOWA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICE – DEPARTMENT OF CULTURAL AFFAIRS FOR HOSTING OF THE 2018 NATIONAL ALLIANCE OF PRESERVATION COMMISSION'S FORUM CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the National Alliance of Preservation Commissions is seeking bids to host the 2018 FORUM conference, which is a national conference for historic preservation commissioners, commission staff, elected officials, design professionals, developers and other interested individuals to attend to learn of innovating approaches to addressing challenging preservation issues; and

WHEREAS, the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA) wishes to partner with the City of Des Moines in submitting a bid to host the 2018 FORUM conference, and DCA would be the lead agency should Des Moines be selected as the host city location; and

WHEREAS, a local match from the DCA and City would be required if Des Moines is selected as the host city location; and

WHEREAS, in order to fund the required local match, local partners are expected to provide a minimum of \$35,000 in local sponsorship, grants and unrestricted financial support and the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs has pledged \$10,000 to the effort and has identified a Certificate Local Government Grant program administered by the State that may be available to the City to provide an additional \$12,000; and

WHEREAS, the Preservation Iowa organization has pledged \$500 and volunteer support, and the Des Moines Neighbors, North of Grand Neighborhood Association and the Iowa Architectural Foundation have pledged volunteer support; and

WHEREAS, the effort to secure additional financial and volunteer support would continue should Des Moines be selected as the host city; and

WHEREAS, the match amount required of the City of Des Moines is estimated at \$5,000 to \$10,000, depending upon the fundraising efforts and DCA funding to be provided; and

WHEREAS, hosting the conference would allow the accomplishments and innovative strategies that have been used in Des Moines to be showcased to a national audience, and would provide an affordable opportunity for the Des Moines Historic Preservation Commission, City staff, elected officials, design professionals, developers and interested citizens to attend a national conference; and

WHEREAS, the event is expected to attract a minimum of 400 participants with the knowledge that the largest FORUM conference to date attracted nearly 800 participants, which would provide an economic benefit to Des Moines' hotels and businesses.

The Department of Cultural Affairs and the State Historic Preservation Office are excited about the possibility of hosting the 2018 FORUM in Des Moines.

Our staff has much to offer in terms of organizational abilities and a commitment to excellent training opportunities for the preservation community. Our 2015 statewide conference was our most successful and best attended preservation conference to date with 350 attendees who came to learn about historic plaster, tax credits, preserving community character and other preservation topics. Our 2018 FORUM proposal speaks to our other strengths—among them having the largest Certified Local Government program in the nation, a successful historic tax credit program and an exceptional partner in the city of Des Moines.

Des Moines has a unique preservation story to share with a national audience:



Developing the Bicycle and Trail Master plan: www.iowabicyclecoalition.org

In 2011, Des Moines was named a Bronze level bike-friendly community by the League of American Bicyclists.

In Sept. 2010, Des Moines became the 5th city in America to implement a bike sharing project: Des Moines B-Cycle: http://desm

The Des Moines Bicycle Collective refurbishes used bikes, offers repair classes, conducts safety outreach, produces trail maps and promotes cycling as a fun, healthy, sustainable way to get around town:

The Mayor's Annual Bike Ride for Trails is a popular Spring event, raising more than \$100,000 for trails.

The 37th Annual RAGBRAI (Register's Annual Great Bike Ride Across Iowa) will be July 24-30, 2011. It is the oldest, largest and longest bike touring event in the world.

In 2010, Ingersoll Avenue went on a "road diet," scaling down from 4 lanes to 2, including bike lanes, in an effort to improve safety and traffic calming.

Bike Safety 101

Obey all traffic rules. Watch for uneven road surfaces. Ride together. In bike lane, ride single file. If no bike lane, "take the lane," two riders side-by-side. Leave adequate space while passing parked cars. Ride with the traffic. Stay to the right. Be a defensive biker. No cell phones please. Use proper hand signals when turning. Wear comfortable shoes; appropriate clothing. Also bring a water bottle, ID, emergency contact information. Helmets available at check-in.



FINANCIAL INCENTIVES AND TOOLS: The Neighborhood Finance Corporation has given more than \$10 million in loans since 1998 to North of Grand residents. The NFC is a non-profit mortgage banker that finances the purchase of, and/or improvements to, single and multi-family housing within designated neighborhoods. The NFC delivers funds from financial institutions, Polk County, and the City of Des Moines to individual homeowners, homebuyers and developers. www.neighborhoodfinance.org

A determination of eligibility for the National Register of Historic Places opens the door to substantial benefits. Property owners can take advantage of state historic tax credits and other funding sources to offset rehabilitation costs. Residents can take pride in rehabilitated properties, which will help reduce blight, curb crime and boost the economic vitality of the area. www.iowahistory.org

NEIGHBORHOOD PEDESTRIAN COMMERCIAL (NPC) ZONING:

Properties on Ingersoll Avenue are zoned primarily NPC. Riding along today are three NPC experts: Mayor Frank Cownie, former chair of the Plan & Zoning Commission that helped create NPC zoning, current Plan & Zoning Commissioner and Ingersoll business owner Ted Irvine, and city planner Mike Ludwig. City documents state: The "district is intended for early 20th century streetcar and automobile corridors with a variety of retail shopping, office use, and apartments. The district is characterized by multistory brick apartments and one- and two-story commercial buildings with multiple tenants and minimal setback from the primary commercial street. This district includes specialty retail and office uses that serve the adjacent residential areas as well as the entire city. It is the intention of this division that the classification as neighborhood pedestrian commercial will aid in the preservation and stabilization of the commercial corridor along the primary commercial street by improving the pedestrian access, promoting retail density, protecting the adjacent residential districts, and protecting the character of the district. ... To ensure compatibility of development with the neighborhood and the maximum flexibility for the property owner, development within an NPC district is tied to a review of the site plan by the plan and zoning commission and city council."

COMPLETE STREETS: Ingersoll Avenue is an important commuter east-west route, serving 12,000-17,000 vehicles daily. Traffic engineer Gary Fox will ride with us today, sharing stories about Ingersoll's "road diet" to improve safety and traffic calming, Livable Streets Coalition sums it up well: "The goal of traffic calming is to encourage multiple types of transportation (car, bike,walk, bus) and improve the safety and livability of a neighborhood for all users. What sometimes gets overlooked is that safe, pedestrian-friendly neighborhoods are also the types of places where people want to shop, dine out and own a home. In short, traffic calming improves the economic bottom line for local businesses." www.completestreets.org

INVESTING IN INGERSOLL: Ingersoll Avenue is a mixed-use neighborhood business district, an ideal Main Street community, in that it is a place "of shared memory where people still come together to live. work, and play," Establishments



like Zanzibar's, Palmer's Deli and Bauder Pharmacy are what urban sociologist Ray Oldenburg refers to as great "third places," in contrast to "the first and second places of home and work." These third places are within walking distance, where customers and employees are on a first-name

basis, and where you can find a good bite to eat-another reason why we bike! During our lunch stop at Palmer's, check out the revitalized section from 28th to 31st streets. Note updated decorative lighting, widened pedestrian sidewalks, expanded on-street parking, new street trees, benches, bike racks, planter urns and flower beds. www.ingersollave.com

Many individuals and leaders have made major investments in Ingersoll Avenue, Generous corporate support, city, county and state funding, grants and private donations (about \$3.4 million) funded the first phase of Restoration Ingersoll. Ingersoll is



comprised of many invaluable and irreplaceable historic, cultural and architectural resources. Stakeholders along the Ingersoll corridor are identifying these assets and creating opportunities to engage visitors and residents so these treasures will remain to enhance Des Moines for future generations.

HISTORY: Ingersoll Avenue is named for Ebenezer Jared Ingersoll (1828-1901), bank and insurance executive and farmer, who raised thoroughbread stock. Historian Kaye Sanchez writes that Ingersoll was a "person of athletic build, nervous lymphatic temperament, brusque and plain of speech, often using vigorous swear words.



Early records describe the Iowa State Fair held at Brown's Park on the western edge of Ingersoll's business district (39th to 42nd Streets) starting in 1879. In 1886, the Fair moved to its present location on the east side of Des Moines. The safe, affordable, tree-lined neighborhoods along Ingersoll remain popular today due to their close proximity to shops, restaurants, the bus line, well-established churches, quality schools and historic architecture. As we pedal along Ingersoll, try to imagine residents back in 1890 commuting via the Des Moines Rapid Transit dummy line. It probably ran at about the same speed as our B-Cycles and not at the expense of our health and the environment.

the commercial/institutional exterior adaptive reuse category. If not for the work of several

individuals, "Ol' 12" would have been razed. Today it is home to the medical practice of Dr. Brenton Koch.



There are high costs involved when properties are allowed to deteriorate (vandalism. crime, foreclosures, loss of property tax revenues, loss of architectural heritage, etc.). One example is the Stockdale Double House, located at 4018

Ingersoll Ave. (shown in this 1926 photo). In 2009, Iowa's State Historic Preservation Office determined it was eligible for the National Register. The fate of the structure is currently uncertain. I am writing to express the River Bend Neighborhood Association's enthusiastic support of Des Moines's bid to host the 2018 FORUM.

The River Bend neighborhood is located north of downtown and was developed as a late nineteenth century street car suburb. River Bend is composed of seven different National Historic districts and we are proud that in 2012 a large portion of our neighborhood was designated a local historic district with design review requirements. Demographically, our neighborhood is young (half the population is under the age of 30) and more culturally diverse than the rest of the city. Thirty percent of the population in River Bend is Latino, 24% African American, 10% Asian, and 14% Caucasian.

We are working proactively to preserve the historic quality of our neighborhood and its other great asset—its diversity. We have partnered with several developers on preservation projects such as the Franklin Apartments to provide quality, affordable housing. Trinity United Methodist Church is both a model preservation project and an inclusive community that cares about the integration of faith and social justice. We also hold an annual historic home tour and have recently completed a neighborhood plan in cooperation with Iowa State University design students. Finally, we partner with the Sixth Avenue Corridor (an Urban Main Street) to make our commercial center as vibrant as the rest of our neighborhood.

River Bend has a great story to tell, and if Des Moines is selected, our organization pledges to assist with planning tour(s) of our neighborhood and/or participating in a session on the challenges and opportunities of preservation in an inner city neighborhood. We will also contribute volunteers to the conference.
