Request for additional mobile vendor zones

Good Morning Diane

These are the overall talking points for my presentation to Council on 9/12/16.

The Legion of Food has been discussing internally the desire and necessity of additional On-Street Mobile Vendor Zones. It is due to the rising popularity and significant growth of the industry that we make this request of the Des Moines City Council.

On behalf of the Legion of Food, I respectfully request that the City of Des Moines consider the addition of the following to the On-Street Mobile Vendor Zones:

Where:

- 1. Grand Avenue from 3rd Street to 15th Street
- 2. Locust from 3rd to 16th Street
- 3. Walnut from 3rd Street to 16th Street
- 4. All connecting streets between Grand and Locust and Locust and Walnut within the boundaries of Items 1, 2, and 3 above.
- 5. University Avenue Drake University area (roughly 21st 31st)

Justification

- 1. Metro-wide rise in popularity of the Food Truck Industry has created significant demand for the trucks. In particular, from office parks in the suburbs. This has been drawing many of the trucks away from the downtown area.
- 2. West Des Moines has developed a new transient merchant permit which allows up to 4 food trucks on a single commercial property. This is also attracting the trucks since a group of trucks can attract bigger crowds for lunch service.
- 3. Current zones B,C & D have not proved to be productive due to the lack of consistent customer foot traffic.
- 4. Zone A has proved to be difficult to serve due to conflicts with school buses and a shortage of Sculpture Park curbside vending areas due to one-way streets.
- 5. The food truck industry has evolved into a fast lunch alternative for employees in the downtown area and business parks in the suburbs. Zone A is also too far away from many of the employers in downtown.
- 6. Other metropolitan area (Minneapolis as an example) establish truck zones near skywalk entrances for ease of access to the trucks for downtown customers. This also creates the opportunity for trucks to operate in the winter months.
- 7. Building owners and managers are now looking to food trucks for additional lunch service options as the speed and efficiency of the trucks can reduce the amount of time an employee requires for lunch.
- 8. The notion of food trucks out in front of office buildings in downtown was well received by BOMA (Building Owners and Managers Association). Many of the requests came from this group.
- 9. The requested additions by-and-large are food deserts with few street-side restaurants available. The 100' rule would apply for the relatively few restaurants in these corridors.
- 10. By providing more areas for trucks to operate, this will reduce the competition between trucks, buses and the general public in regards to valuable parking spots downtown.

- 11. By encouraging office employees to leave their buildings during lunch and breaks the Food Trucks enhance the walkability of the Downtown sector.
- 12. Additional lunch-time zones would reduce the desire and the need for late night food service by the trucks.
- 13. Since the growth of the industry is outpacing the available space, additional zones will be necessary to maintain the fun and collaborative culture of the Food Trucks. There are currently 42 food trucks in the Legion of Food. At the end of 2015 there were 24 trucks in our association.

We understand that this is a significant and high level request but we are trying to be proactive in staying ahead of the continued growth of the industry. Please let me know if I can provide any other information.
