To whom it may concern,

My name is Shawna Isaac and I am a senior police officer with the Des Moines Police Department. I am also the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program Coordinator for the City of Des Moines. I have overseen this program for the past three years and have also worked closely with the Des Moines Municipal Housing Agency on a regular basis in an attempt to maintain the best standards possible at their multi-family dwellings. Through their participation in this program, multiple program requirements are met through an on-going basis to ensure full cooperation which allows us to combat crime together. To begin, Crime Free Multi-Housing is an international program designed to reduce crime, drugs and gangs at apartment communities. This program consists of three phases that support each other in combatting crime, reducing calls for service, creating a more stable resident base, and educating staff as well as residents for an optimal outcome.

Phase-1 is called Active Property Management. Through this requirement, PHA staff attends a 1-day certification course that focuses heavily on the topics of The Application Process, Building Communities, Rental Agreements, Lease Addendums, Dealing with Non-Compliance, Safety & Prevention, Combatting Illegal Activity, and Building a Partnership with the Police. This certification must be renewed a minimum of every two years for staff to be considered current. DMMHA staff meets this requirement on an annual basis. In addition to the certification component, staff is expected to work WITH the police department to collaborate in solutions when crime or other issues that affect quality of life are identified at the property level. Many of these are identified through analysis of the calls-for-service history which are evaluated on a monthly basis between the CFMH office and DMMHA staff. Actions are expected when serious issues arise which further demonstrates the organization's commitment to active property management.

Phase-2 of the program is called CPTED which stands for Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design. In this phase, the property is evaluated for layout and other environmental concerns. There are 7 mandatory pass-fail criteria that must be met and then maintained for a property to be CPTED compliant. DMMHA has four properties that have met

full CPTED certification. In addition, they have been actively working to improve other locations through the inspection process to also meet the requirement and become fully CFMH compliant. In order to achieve this goal, the DMMHA was provided with a check-list outlining the mandatory minimum requirements which are:

- 1. Dead bolt locks on all apartment entry doors
- 2. Eye viewers on all apartment entry doors
- 3. Lift & slide protection on windows
- 4. List & slide protection on sliding doors accessible from the ground level
- 5. Strike plates with 3" screws
- 6. Proper trimming of trees & bushes
- 7. Adequate security lighting

These requirements, once met, must be maintained in order to be program-compliant. At all random checks, DMMHA has met the requirement and demonstrated on-going maintenance as outlined by the program. There are other elements evaluated to include fencing visibilities, clear lines of sight, common areas layouts, money-handling procedures, etc. These items do not dictate a pass vs. fail score in the inspection, but they are noted in the final review and suggestions are provided as necessary to provide feedback and additional consideration for property enhancements.

Phase-3 of the program is the Tenant Social which is the opportunity for officers to meet the tenants and share a crime-free message which is generally delivered in a presentation format. The objective is to engage the residents and instill them with the mindset to support the Crime Free program principles at their property which further enables management for success. DMMHA must host DMPD at each location once per year as we educate residents about self-accountability, reporting problems and utilizing police resources, among other topics.

Through active participation in this program and the three noted phases that structure the concept, multiple suggestions have been made pertaining to the various DMMHA properties that I believe will further enhance safety and crime prevention while also enabling follow-up investigations and serving as a general tool(s) for enforcement. Among these suggestions are additions of security cameras, upgrades to existing security cameras, primary entry door upgrades, additions of fencing (that meets the clear line-of-sight concepts outlined in CPTED), and alarms. Given the calls-for-service data for the properties, the neighborhoods of their location, and the city as a whole, I believe these additions would greatly enhance the existing and underlying efforts already in place through the CFMH program participation and would greatly combat the existing crime while deterring any potential future crime that might take place at DMMHA properties.

I am pleased to write an endorsement for consideration of the Des Moines Municipal Housing Agency due to the good-standing relationship they hold with the Des Moines Police Department and their commitment to keep crime out of rental properties. I would be happy to
