

DART envisions a network of bus shelters that enhance the experience of riding DART, enliven streetscapes and create moments of creative inspiration while reinforcing a positive image of public transportation. Ingersoll Avenue and its **Route 60** bus stop shelters were selected for this unique public art partnership.

The Avenues' Arts & Culture committee collaborated with DART to invite art shelter concepts that represent the **people, places and pathways** of The Avenues. Preference was given to artists with local or lowa connections. The public engagement process included The Avenues Board of Directors, Ingersoll business owners and citizens.

Concepts from **Mary Jones** and **Karen Strohbeen** were selected for our corridor. Both artists are represented by Moberg Gallery and have had works displayed within The Avenues district in the past. Jones is also included on DART's art shelter artist roster, as was a third finalist whose work was not selected. Each artist will have two pairs of art shelters. Both received positive feedback during the public engagement process:

- People felt Jones' work "represents everyone" and were charmed with her grid depictions of our neighborhood.
- Many recognized Strohbeen's work and used words like "happiness" and "hope" to describe their favorite concepts.


